"The Good, the Bad, and the Ugly"

"The good, the bad, and the ugly"; that is what Doug Garner promised to deliver to those in attendance at the **Tennessee Valley AFA** Chapter's 4 Feb meeting, and that is just what he did. For almost 45 minutes he kept everyone "spellbound" as they experienced what it must have been like to be a young airmen in the European theater during WW II. In the simplest of terms, the good-we won the war, the bad-thousands of lives lost, and the ugly-the mistreatment POWs experienced.

His plane, "Miss Behave", was one of 18,000 B-24 Liberators which flew in WWII flying faster, farther, and carrying a heavier load than any of bomber at that time, is how Doug passionately described his second love (the first, being his wife Patsy). A member of 8th AF, he knew his chances of making it to the magical 30th

mission was only one in three. In fact, throughout the war, 8th AF alone experienced 26,000 casualties and 28,000 POWs, the greatest percentage of any other unit in the war.

A "country-boy" from central Alabama, he was a Senior in High School when the Japanese attacked Pearl Harbor. Following graduation he joined the Aviation Cadet Program. A shortage of combat crew members (gunners), would redirect Doug's dream as a pilot to Tyndall Field Gunnery School. There he lived and breathed the 50 caliber machine gun. He described his final exam as having to put a 50-cal together blindfolded --- complicated with the inclusion of broken and missing parts!

Assigned to 93rd Bomb Group, RAF Hardwick was his home in England. There he participated in 30 combat missions. The 93rd flew the famous Ploesti Raid against the Romanian Oil Refineries, where 178 B-24s launched from Benghazi, conducting a thenrevolutionary low-altitude (200 ft) bomb run.

One of many touching moments was when Doug described flying with his baby's shoes (a baby he hadn't yet seen) draped around his neck for good luck. In fact, he showed the group those same shoes, now-bronzed.

vital to the future of the nation," said S. Sanford Schlitt, Vice Chairman of the Board, Aerospace Education. "These grants increase the visibility of the aerospace career field for some talented students."


"We need to generate interest in aerospace early, and begin developing tomorrow's innovators," said Mike Dunn, President of AFA.


