In early 2011, the Huntsville-Madison County Veteran's Memorial Foundation approached our Chapter to contribute to the memorial site being developed in downtown Huntsville. Teacher of the Year Attends Aerospace Education Workshop

The Aerospace Education Workshop sponsored by the Montgomery Chapter of the Air Force Association in June was both inspiring and unforgettable. We flew on a 908th Airlift Wing C-130 from Maxwell AFB to Edwards AFB for a 6-day aerospace career immersion event. There were 45 participants on this trip and I made some lifelong friends and have since teamed with some of them to work on aerospace education projects. Major Lynn Toney of the Civil Air Patrol and I worked together through virtual means to create a presentation for the Alabama AFA Conference that was held in Huntsville last August.

On our trip we toured aerospace related areas on and off Edwards AFB including the Global Hawk Unmanned Aerial Vehicle test group and the NASA/Dryden Flight Research Center with its SOFIA airplane and F-18 simulators. We went to the Mojave Air and Space Port where we were given a private viewing of Spaceship 2 at Virgin Galactic. We also spent a day at the Tehachapi Wind Turbine Farm and the Terra-Gyn Power Center and learned about wind energy and how wind turbines are built and maintained. We spent another day touring the NASA Jet Propulsion Laboratory with a private tour of the "Mars Yard" and a clone of the Curiosity Rover. We followed up this tour with a trip to the Yanks Aviation Museum where we saw aircraft from every decade and even participated in a simulation of the parachute jump on D-day. Our finale was a visit to the Southern California Soaring Academy where I was the first to get to fly a sailplane over the San Gabriel mountain range. The flight was breathtaking and phenomenal.

Upon my return home, I received patches from two Air Force airmen. Susan Mallett sent me a flight suit which I proudly wore on the first day of school with the patches that had been presented to me. I got to speak to the entire third and fifth grade in their classrooms about my trip. All of the students were delighted by the details from the trip and several students wanted to know how they could get to do all these exciting things. I hung photos from my trip outside my class-



He taught them the often-heard Proverb that "a chain is only as strong as its weakest link" by taking them to the trophy hallway in their school.

Lastly, he talked about how one of his kids took up for another one when someone said that boy couldn't win the top award because he was mongoloid. Kersjes' kid said, "No he's not! He's American!" But most touching was how that boy with Down's Syndrome, after winning the top award in the whole camp, cut his award into 22 pieces and gave each person on his team a piece of it...because they had earned it. What a valuable lesson in how to be a winner. — Cathy Scott


