"Top in Class" Valley Teacher Wins Best in State

For the third year in a row, Alabama's AFA Teacher of the Year comes from the Tennessee Valley. This year's selectee is Ms. Lynn Toney from Boaz Intermediate School. Last month during the meeting of the Boaz City School Board, Susan Mallett, VP for Alabama AFA, and Russ Lewey, Tennessee Valley AFA Chapter's VP for Aerospace Education, presented both the Chapter and State Awards to Ms. Toney. In his letter of endorsement, Mr. Jamie Burton, Principal of Boaz Intermediate School, stated, "No other educator...does a better job bringing "real world" STEM activities to her classroom on a regular basis in new and exciting ways." Russ expanded upon that endorsement, pointing out how Ms. Toney provided instruction and expertise to Tennessee Valley teachers during the Chapter's February Teacher Workshop. CyberPatriot-V State Winners Hail from North Alabama!

Northern Alabama CyberPatriot teams recently took the top three State honors in the Open and All-Service Divisions during the 5th National High School Cyber Defense competition sponsored by the Air Force Association, industry and educational partners. In addition to taking State honors, the teams below all advanced to the Semi-Finals competing against over 1,200 teams registered across the U.S. (and overseas Department of Defense schools). The Valor Division Naval Sea Cadet Corps (of Gardendale) received an all-expense paid trip to Washington DC and competed against 11 other finalist teams. They were recognized as the top Naval Cadet Corps team in the All-Service Division.

State winners in the Open Division include:

Second Place: Virgil I. Grissom High School (coached by Ms. Christine Sutton), Huntsville

Third Place: New Century Technology High School (coached by Mr. David Bloom)

State winners in the All-Service Division are:

First Place: Valor Division Naval Sea Cadet Corps (coached by Mr. Kelly Jones), Gardendale

Second Place: New Century Technology/Lee High School Army ROTC (coached by Mr. Michael Coleman), Huntsville

Third Place: Pell City Civil Air Patrol Composite Squadron (coached by Ms. Jeannie Scott), Anniston

The Gardendale and Anniston teams are comprised of students from around the area, with some living two-and-a-half hours away. The Anniston team has two students from there, and one student each from the Boaz, Oneonta, and Alpine areas.

Currently in its sixth year, CyberPatriot is the premiere High School Cyber Defense competition created to inspire students toward careers in cyber security or other science, technology, engineering, and mathematics (STEM) disciplines critical to our

nation's future. It's not a hacking competition, but one in which teams compete to identify and correct vulnerabilities in multiple operating systems.

AFA is providing special recognition to the winning schools, coaches, and individual team members. 

Cadets Re-create Lindbergh's Famous Flight to Paris

In May 1927, a young American pilot flew a single engine plane non-stop 3,600 miles in 33 and 1/2 hours from New York to Paris. Charles Lindbergh became an international hero and celebrity. In today's vernacular, the event immediately "went viral" and remains one of the most celebrated events in aviation history.

On Friday morning (15 Feb 13) eight AFJROTC cadets at Bob Jones High School re-created the event IN REAL TIME using computer flight simulation equipment in the AFJROTC classroom. Students were using Microsoft's Flight Simulator Century of Flight, which models the Spirit of St Louis flown by Lindbergh. In addition to learning the science, engineering, and history of the flight, they faced the same challenges of navigation, problem-solving, and fatigue that Lindbergh faced in his journey. Two of the aircraft were flown by a pair of pilots and four were flown solo by a single pilot. Pilots were allowed a five minute break every two hours, with every third break extended to ten minutes. The rules of engagement also put a 36 hour total time limit for the flight.

The flight began at 0900 from Long Island, NY. Within an hour, all six airplanes were over Cape Cod headed up the US east coast. Six hours later, the planes skirted the coast of Nova Scotia. It took another four and a half hours to reach Newfoundland, the last spot of land before the Atlantic. Over the North Atlantic, the pilots went through a nighttime period with no land references to guide them. They continued to rely on a navigation technique called dead reckoning, an adjustment of heading at regular intervals to stay on course. Twenty-seven hours into the flight, the first pilot passed over Ireland. At hour 31, it was obvious not all pilots were going to be as fortunate as Lucky Lindy.

One plane ditched in the North Atlantic, too far from

land with too little fuel. One plane, also low on fuel, made it to Ireland and landed safely. Two planes landed successfully in England after running short of time and fuel. One plane attempted to make it over the English Channel, but fell short of France and ditched in the water. And finally, one pilot, Daniel Irvine, crossed the Channel, found the mouth of the Seine River on the French Coastline, and followed it all the way to Paris, with a successful landing, arriving in 32 hours, 39 minutes and besting Lindbergh's 33 and a half-hour time.


