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"MIG Killer": F-4 Restoration

F-4C tail number 640-838 has resided in the Aviation Challenge area of the US Space and Rocket Center for more than 20 years. This aircraft is a MIG killer from Operation Bolo over North Vietnam in 1967. Our local Tennessee Valley chapter, in partnership with US Space and Rocket Center, is doing initial planning to restore and preserve this distinguished fighter aircraft. A volunteer group of veteran F-4 Phantom maintainers and aircrew have met to review the needs of this restoration effort. The intent

is to restore the aircraft to its original Vietnam paint scheme and configure it for an air-to-air mission. We developed an initial list of missing equipment and are now coordinating the way forward with US Space and Rocket Center management. Our intent is to begin sanding and bending metal this coming spring. At that time, volunteers will be needed, and our lead crew chief has assured us that he can tell us what to do and where to go.





Reaching for the Stars

Many of us remember our early childhoods and wanting to be like those early astronaut legends: Alan Shepard, Gordon Cooper, and Neil Armstrong! With cuts in the program at NASA, today's youth

have lost that dream. Last year, drawing upon the successes of CyberPatriot, the Office of the Secretary of the Air Force turned to the AFA to see how we can help stimulate an interest in space. In less than a year, AFA with help from the US Air Force Academy and US Space Command, have created "StellarXplorers". The program was beta tested last year with five teams from Colorado. The concept was solid, and this year AFA National gave a "green light" for the competition to expand to 40 teams – 2 of which will be from the Tennessee Valley.

Officially, the vision of the StellarXplorers program is to inspire and motivate pre-college age students and their educators to pursue studies and careers in STEM through a challenging, space system design competition. StellarXplorers will provide a self-contained academic/education component as a curriculum supplement. Competition will employ computer simulations for orbit

determination and propagation, computer-aided system design, system performance assessment, and budgetary constraints.

The program focuses on the following areas:

- Stimulating in students an understanding of the criticality of a healthy and enduring U.S. economy based on science, technology, engineering, and mathematics expertise.
- Educating students on fundamental aspects of space system engineering, assembly, integration, test, and operations.
- Exposing students to university education and space industry career possibilities.
- Facilitating space industry internship and scholarship opportunities to program participants.
- Increasing the awareness of the American public on our dependence on space and its impact on our modern life.

Local area teams are already registered and beginning practice rounds with the official competition beginning in January. Watch for next quarter's newsletter to see how our area teams are doing in the competition. 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



Loss of Local Air Force Warrior

Major General Chris T. Anzalone, USAF (Ret), 60, of Huntsville passed away at his home on Sunday, September 27, 2015, following a short battle with cancer. General Anzalone served over 32 years in the United States Air Force.

He received his commission through the Air Force ROTC Program at the Florida Technological University, Orlando, where he was a fellow cadet with our own Russ Lewey. He was a distinguished graduate of Undergraduate Navigator Training. He served as an F-111F weapon systems officer as well as test and tactics development chief for the EF-111A tactical jamming system. His commands included a flying squadron, mission support group, and an air base wing. He conducted joint war planning for contingency operations supporting the Global War on Terrorism while serving on the Joint Staff. The general also served as Vice Commander of the Air Armament Center at Eglin AFB, FL and Warner Robins Air Logistics Center at Robins AFB, For his final assignment, he served as the Deputy for Test, Integration, and Fielding for the Missile Defense Agency in Huntsville. retired from the Air Force in 2009, he served as

President of L-3/Coleman Aerospace and later as Chief Operating Officer of MEI Technologies.

General Anzalone was known as a true patriot and stood as an example of integrity, selflessness and practical competency. It is worth noting some of the personal tributes that were made by fellow Air Force members:

"He took a special interest in helping me learn and succeed on the Air Staff." "He had a way of aligning differing expectations that would resonate with all involved for a favorable outcome." "The world lost a very superb guy who loved his family and served his country very admirably." "I learned a lot from him. His inspirational leadership was amazing." "I will never forget his smile, his enthusiasm, and his friendliness."

Major General Chris Anzalone not only excelled in a vast array of Air Force assignments, but he made our service a better organization with his unique dedication, commitment, and perseverance. Most importantly, General Anzalone was not just a good officer, he was a wonderful person and a respected model for all who served with him.
